## About the exhibition:

First Pieces: Board Games in Translation exposes the viewer to poems and game boards from diverse cultural and historical settings. The poems contain the first mention of an ancient game name or a set of playing rules, some of which are still known today. The game boards are displayed in contrasting contexts, highlighting the role of translation in understanding board games and those who played them across time and space.
